Village Manager Lafayette Linear & Village of University Park Departments

The **Board-approved resolution** seeking a jurisdictional transfer of 1.6 miles of road on University Parkway from Western Ave to Stuenkel Road has been forwarded to Will County. The **Will County Road Commission approved** the item on **September 20**. Will County officials advise me that the next step in the process is their submission to IDOT in Schaumburg. They will review the package and submit to the Springfield office for final signatures. This process normally takes two to three weeks. I will keep readers updated as this works its way through the system.

UPDATE - Underground plumbing work has been completed at the **Kids Health Center**, a major component of the renovation. We have identified an electrician to perform the next phase of the work. After that dry wall will be installed, followed by installation of the floor.

We continue to seek a new **Public Works Director** and **Director of Economic Development**.

FREE ALCOHOL EDUCATION SEMINAR

All owners and employees responsible for the distribution of alcoholic beverages in the **Village of University Park**, were invited to attend a **FREE CERTIFIED Beverage Alcohol Sellers and Servers Education and Training (BASSET)** class. Such training is required in accordance with **state law** and local **ordinance**.

The class was held on **Monday, October 22** from **10:00 a.m. - 2:00 p.m.** at **90 Towncenter**.

Free registration and participation was limited to **two employees** per liquor establishment.

Also, from **Monday October 22 - Friday, October 26**, the **University Park Police Department** and **Illinois Liquor Commission** will be co-sponsoring **Red Ribbon Week**, a series of seminars designed to help liquor establishment owners/employees recognize signs of intoxication, enabling them to avoid liability when patrons become involved in alcohol-related incidents.

The BASSETT Training and Red

Ribbon Week will enable distributors to:

- Comply with state laws and local ordinances
- Learn to recognize early signs of intoxication
- End underage drinking by better identifying fake ID cards

THIS IN FROM AREA MANAGER MELISSA KAHOUN, AQUA ILLINOIS

Aqua held an **Aqua Connects** open house in the **Village of University Park** on **Wednesday, September 12**.

About **60** people attended to ask questions about the company, their bills, new rates, water quality, water softening, and the distribution system. The open house was set up to allow customers to visit different booths and question Aqua employees stationed at each booth. Most customers in attendance visited each booth.

Aqua representatives discussed many questions regarding water conservation, water meters, and how to identify leaks in the home. Customers were advised how to read their meter, and how to use the meter to monitor their usage, and determine if they have a leak.

In addition, water softening options were discussed. It was explained that the new rates were the result of Aqua

investing \$10 million since the last rate change, to ensure:

- adequate water and waste water treatment
- improved water quality
- better fire protection
- increased reliability of the system

So far improvements include:

- increasing waste water treatment capacity to 2.43 million gallons
- constructing new wells
- replacing mains and
- disinfection system improvements

Because of investments that Aqua has made in University Park, the community is able to grow and accommodate new businesses and jobs.

Aqua has voluntarily held the Aqua Connects open houses for the past three years in University Park. They are held to allow representatives from Aqua to connect with our customers, to answer questions, and help them better understand the water industry.

PENNSYLVANIA'S VOTER ID LAW RULED UNENFORCEABLE... FOR NOVEMBER 6TH ELECTION.

Commonwealth Court Judge Robert Simpson has ruled that Pennsylvania officials **cannot enforce** a new voter identification law in the November 6th Presidential election.

In granting a preliminary injunction prohibiting enforcement Judge Simpson expressed concern that the law would likely disqualify eligible voters.

"I am not convinced that there will be no voter disenfranchisement arising out of the commonwealth's implementation of a voter identification requirement for purposes of the upcoming election."

Unless Judge Simpson later issues a permanent injunction, the voter ID law could be enforced beginning in 2013.

Pennsylvania is one of 31 states with some form of voter ID requirement. There are four other states, in addition to Pennsylvania, whose voter ID laws are under review or legal challenge.

In the August issue of **COMMUNICATE!** readers were asked to track **Senate Bill 2496** and **House Bill 3903**, which if passed would add Illinois to the list of states requiring voter photo ID.


The only thing that will be remembered about the **Republican National Convention**, is that **Actor/Director Clint Eastwood**, spent several minutes talking to an empty chair.

WOULD YOU GIVE A BRIEF OVERVIEW OF EACH DAY'S ACTIVITIES?

Each day we attended DMO and DNC meetings, as well as those of other groups, not to mention all of the parties and other festivities. On Tuesday evening, **Mrs. Michelle Obama** spoke, delivering an outstanding address. On Wednesday legendary (**former**) **President Bill Clinton** addressed the convention. His speech was truly remarkable and inspiring.

On Thursday, the convention which was scheduled for the **Bank of America football stadium**, was moved back to the **Time Warner Arena**, because of threatening weather. Both **Vice President Joe Biden** and **President Barack Obama** spoke. The Biden speech was emotionally riveting and inspiring.

When President Obama took the stage, the crowd went wild with chants of four more years, forward, not back, engulfing the stadium. It took 10 minutes before he could speak. WERE YOU ON THE CONVENTION FLOOR WHEN PRESIDENT OBAMA WAS NOMINATED FOR A SECOND TERM?

WHAT DID YOU LEARN AT THE DEMOCRATIC CONVENTION THAT WILL HELP YOU IN YOUR ROLE AS A UNIVERSITY PARK TRUSTEE?

Attending the DNC reinforced that doing the right thing is always right, regardless of opinions. As a Trustee in University Park, I realize how important decisions at the local level can immediately affect our residents' quality of life.

WHAT IS YOUR REACTION TO THE RECENT USA TODAY POLL IN WHICH 90 MILLION PEOPLE INDICATED THAT THEY DO NOT PLAN TO VOTE IN THE NOVEMBER 6TH ELECTION?

Here is what I would like to say to those people. **First**, I know that there are attempts nationwide to restrict voting rights. In some states it appears that minority and Latino communities are being heavily targeted. We have battled for so long to earn the right to vote. Please don't give it back. Don't get discouraged or fatigued. The right to vote is yours, mine and our future generations.

We cannot fall prey to those who want to oppress us as a people, not to vote. That is giving them what they want, voter apathy. There has been bloodshed on our behalf for these rights, which we should not neglect.

So, if you're reading this, and you are one of those **90 million** who don't intend to vote, do not allow those purposely setting out to discourage you to become victorious. Their intent is to give you the illusion that "your" vote, "your" voice does not count and should not be heard (basically, by the upcoming election).

State Senator Toi Hutchinson

State Senator Toi Hutchinson has been a member of the Illinois Senate since January 2009 and has since earned a reputation as a highly effective and well-regarded public servant.


Senator Hutchinson believes that this is "...the first step in providing some progressivity to our income tax code by tying the personal exemption to inflation."

As vice-chairperson of the Transportation Committee, Senator Hutchinson was chief sponsor of the Illiana Expressway legislation, working with the state of Indiana to connect the two states between Interstate 55 in Illinois and Interstate 65 in Indiana. This will open



up an economic development corridor that will ease truck traffic congestion and provide access to the growing intermodal infrastructure network in Will County; the fastest growing county in the state.

Senator Hutchinson is the chairperson of the Revenue Committee, and as such, takes special interest in the fair taxation of the citizens of Illinois. During Spring Session, Senator Hutchinson sponsored SB400, which increased the earned income tax credit (EITC) for all residents of Illinois. This public act increased the standard exemption for all Illinoisans by fifty dollars and ties all future increases to the Consumer Price Index (CPI). In addition, the EITC was raised from 5% to

political party in the country, bringing people together for the common good of all.



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
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
